- 7. **Welcome and Comments:** DG Vince Rosen welcomed all and reiterated his thanks for those helping to pull this meeting together. There are 35 Cabinet Members in Attendance.
 - DG Vince Rosen introduced the speaker, T. J. Tijerina and his spouse Juanita Tijerina. The focus on the presentation was to identify how to move forward and maintain the Lions Legacy.
- **8. Resolutions & Recognitions: Resolution** Lions of District 2-E2 met October 19 for their Fall Conference and Second District Cabinet Meeting. Be it resolved that the District Governor and the District 2-E2 Cabinet express their appreciation in the form of this Resolution recognizing the efforts from all the Staff of the Hilton Garden Inn located in Fort Worth, Texas. 15. ENTITY REPORTS

Texas Lions Camp – Rick Stoorza: Robert Duckworth is the Elected Directors Representative on Executive Committee.

TLC Directors – Robert Duckworth: He is available to attend club meetings to encourage participation and donations from clubs. They served 1,512 children at camp this year. Our District had 127 children. We need help at the work weekends. No matching grants this year. Step up and get some Century Club Members or Life members to continue support the camp.

PDG John Paul Burnett: Visits made so far in the south area of the District are positive about Texas Lions Camp. We are on a mission to keep the bus rolling on the First and Fifth Sessions. Schedules are posted. January 1 starts registration. Diabetes weeks fill up quickly. Children that have never been to camp will be put on a priority this year. Those without sponsors will be signed by PDG John Paul Burnett. It's very important to get these children to the camp. He is open to donations to support the camp bus.

LOEB – Julie Camacho, 1st Vice President of LOEB: Thank you to all who are doing vision assistance screenings and for getting information in early when borrowing equipment. We have a new website which should be more user friendly and provide updated information. We have assisted several clubs with borrowing equipment for multiple vision screenings, mostly back to school. It was reported 136 Lions participated in vision screening events. Reported a total of 1,768 children and 155 adults have been screened. Also reported 436 children have had their hearing screened by Lions. Currently reviewing vision assistance applications from various Lions Clubs. The new Vision Assistance Chair is

Elizabeth Deardorf from Denton. If you need anything you can email Julie at lionicamacho@gmail.com or Emily Rohne.

TLF – PDG Ron Layland: During this year your foundation has given out 13 Emergency Grants of \$2,000 to clubs in the affected areas of 2-S1 and 1-S2. Flooding continues to wreak havoc on Texas. If you have a good project that will benefit a lot of people in your area consider filing for a Humanitarian Grant from TLF. If you need more information contact PDG Ron Layland.

DAC President –Denny Hilleren: We have five school districts participating in Red Ribbon Week. We added Colleyville, Argyle and Saginaw. It's a big deal with what this program is doing. Kids are busy making posters for the Youth Contest. All clubs are encouraged to get to the schools to get the word out about those scholarships.

LCIF Chair – PDG Tom Hayford: LCIF is running it's second year of a three year collection with a goal of raising \$300 million worldwide. So far, we have \$122 millions dollars in pledges with \$106 million in the bank. The district has collected almost \$5,000 towards the Campaign 100 Program. The Governor's goal is \$25 per member, but consider each club donate 100% from every member this year. PDG Tom Hayford is the contact for LCIF Campaign 100, and he is available for presentations.

WSB Chair – PDG Charles Bethards: The capital Campaign kicked off in the fall of 2018 raising funds to replace/repair HVAC systems on the WSB campus. The campaign is on track, but Chairman of the Board, would appreciate any donations Lions or Lions Clubs can provide to the Capital Campaign or the Vision Awards. Another fundraiser is the Annual Vision Award Luncheon where a local person who has been extra supportive of WSB is honored. PDG Charles Bethards plans to organize another tour of 2E2 during the 2019-2020 Lions year. Let him know if your club would like to have a presentation. (See Attachment 7)

PDG Charlie Bethards also talked about Ft. Worth Lighthouse for the Blind Vision Outreach Program. Within the District we don't have a champion for that program. They basically employ visually impaired people to produce products, which often involves teaching life skills. Their Vision Outreach Program they have a laboratory to build eyeglasses. They employ and train people to produce glasses. This organization would like to see all who can't afford glasses, get glasses. (See Attachment 8)

ERC – PDG David Gramm: Thanks to 38 clubs that are already at 100%. 13 clubs have donated 157 hours so far this year, with Non Lions working 500 hours, directors have contributed 1,168 for a total of 1,825 hours on track to exceed last year's totals. Missions were sent to the Philippines, Panama, two missions to Peru, Central America and Mexico. So far, we have sent over 15,000 pairs of glasses. We are on track to meet our record last of 102,000 and currently we output more glasses from Watauga than the other three satellite ERC's combined. We need more volunteers. You can sign up on our website calendar. We can make arrangements to meet during the week for club projects. You can buy a chair for \$100 and we have a wish list that can be donated. Contact Lion Barbara Noblit for more details.

Sports Extravaganza – PDG Tom Westerman: Holding a Go Ball Game, October 25 at 6 PM at Grand Prairie High School. They play completely blinded. It's something to see. There will be a full day at Nimitz High School.

Lions Quest – Juneria Berges: September 11, October 7 and 9 Lions Quest classrooms in Eagle-Mountain-Saginaw ISD and Lake Worth ISD were observed. September 15 Juneria Berges attended the Mental Health training which was mandated by Texas State Legislature. She received her Youth Mental Health First Aid USA Certification. Beginning September 17, she started gathering Lions Quest statistics and validations as to how Lions Quest helps in early identification of students who are faced with normal and/or mental challenges. (See Attachment 9 for more details)

MD-2 TLERC – Jim Cook: Last year 2018-2019 in Mexico they put over 500,000 glasses on people's faces. We need financial support. District 2-E2 does not send any money to TLERC. Asking for support of \$3 per member from every club and/or sponsor a \$100 hole at the 20/20 Vision golf tournament. The new TLERC website, txlerc.org is up and running. Jim encouraged others to contact him if they need any information, or visit the display at this meeting. (See Attachment 10)

15. Committee Reports

Convention Chair – PDG John Paul Burnett: Please note that the January meeting has been moved to the Church of Christ, 1150 John Jones Drive in Burleson. Anyone interested in becoming the Convention Chair get in touch with John Paul and he will start your training immediately.

D. Pam Eckmann encouraged all to take another look at the auction table and bid.

Credentials/Directory/Elections – PDG Carolyn Gramm: No report on Credentials, there will be more information on credentials as we get closer to Convention. She would like to update the online District directory once a quarter. Please email any directory changes with "Directory Changes" in the subject line. There is a link on the website to submit changes.

Elections Chair - PDG David Gramm: No nominations for office submitted as of now. Reminded Vice District Governors to turn in their club letters of recommendation for this year for upcoming election. 2nd Vice District Governor position is open. All entities have positions available, so think about it and sign up for open positions. See David if any questions arise after the meeting.

Leo Chairperson - David Phelps: No Report

Newsletter – DG Vince Rosen: Everyone should have gotten a Newsletter at the beginning of October. He needs to know what clubs are doing in November. There will be another Newsletter going out November 1st. Information is needed by Monday Nov. 3 and we will have another Newsletter in December. Please submit club activities, events, and entities please send something in.

17. Coordinators and Chair Persons

Cultural & Community Chair – PDG Suzanne Henderson: She and Emily Rohne are concerned about the Garden of Life Celebration held in April in Ft. Worth. Concerned that the city now wants to charge admission to the Botanical Gardens. Attendance has grown and it's hard to imagine charging everyone for their attendance. She is working with Director Bob Byer to work out some kind of agreement. She may have to meet with the board.

Diabetes Chair – Sean Bryan: He has been talking with the Ft. Worth Chapter of JDRF to see how a partnership with them would benefit both organizations. He has offered to speak at one of their board meetings. October 6, he participated in a conference call with Lion Gloria Mathur and other District Diabetes Awareness Chairs to discuss current diabetes activities in their districts. October 11, he sent an email to all club presidents and secretaries introducing himself and requesting information on their diabetes activities and needs. He is working on getting a table for Texas Lions Camp at the JDRF Walk in November. November is National Diabetes Month and November 14 is World Diabetes day as established in 1991 by the International Diabetes Federation and the World Health Organization. Our District Clubs can emphasize the Lions focus on diabetes. (See Attachment 11)

IT & Webmaster Chair – PDG Tom Hayford: Don't forget to send club activities to District Secretary so she can forward to the website and to the Newsletter. When sending the pdf files, he makes a jpg file to create a Facebook announcement too. The information lets other clubs see the activities going on throughout the district so they can help promote them or participate in them.

Peace Poster Chair – Michelle Greco: Entries need to be postmarked by November 15th. As of today, she has two. There were eleven or thirteen last year.

Diabetes Essay Contest Chair — Julie Camacho: We finished contest rules, summary and application and the period which students can apply is November 1 thru December 1 — post marked by midnight on November 30. Information should be on the LOEB website and will go onto the 2-E2 website. Concern about the rules prohibiting marriage or annulment, cohabitation with the opposite sex who is unrelated or who has participated in the conception of a child before participation in the MD-2 contest. It appears we are stuck with that due to MD-2 Policy Manual, Council of Governors are responsible for creating and approving any changes to the rules. As a consequence, LOEB is unable to unilaterally change this rule at the district level. The LOEB feels that these rules exclude students for reasons unrelated to education. (See Attachment 12)

Outstanding Youth Contest – Karrie Hayford: Guidelines are posted on the district website. She thinks the Diabetes Essay Contest are up to date with their own tab and all contests.

USA Canada Forum – Reporting 2ndVDG Stan Hall: Stan Hall attended the USA Canada Forum about two weeks ago in Spokane, WA. It was an outstanding venue and outstanding forum. He heard what the President had to stay. DG Vince Rosen and several others also attending. The next forum will be held in Louisville, KY in October of next year.

18. Old Business – PDG Tom Westerman recognized some clubs that supported Sports Extravaganza. The Colleyville Lions Club donated over \$2,800, Crowley Lions Club over \$1,500. There will be plaques for the 2-E2 Governor and for Colleyville Lions Club President. The Mid-Cities Lions Club supported a Go Ball Team. The Crowley Lions Club sponsored a Go Ball team as well as the Colleyville Leos Club. You need to be there at 6:00 Pm on Friday to see the Go Ball teams and 9:00 AM Saturday to see the ceremony start at Nimitz.

PDG Jack Adkson reported that NW Tarrant Lions Club received their club giving for \$50 per member average from LCIF. You don't have to be a large club to make a big imprint.

PDG Pete Koschelew gave an award to Sue Clayton in NW Tarrant Lions Club for 100% club for 2018 & 2019 year.

19. New Business – Don Noblit made a motion that the district donates \$500 to LCIF for the Bahamas Hurricane Relief Fund. He also made a motion that we give \$500 to Texas Lions Foundation for South Texas Flood Relief. Seconded by PDG Jack Adkison. Motion approved.

Pantego Lions Club was recognized for being a 100% Club for the last 10 years.

20. Closing Remarks – PDG Vince Rosen thanked all for attending the 2nd Cabinet meeting and hope all received information that will help with their clubs make a difference.

WSB is an organization based in Little Rock, Arkansas that seeks to provide those with low or no vision, "sustainable independence" (mobility. Life skills, Job skills, etc.). The poster child for WSB is their CEO and Pres., Sharon Giovinazzo (in my view).

The Capital Campaign kicked off in the fall of 2018 is raising funds to replace/repair HVAC systems on the WSB campus. These systems are over 70 years old and badly in need of replacement or updates. Of the \$2M goal (\$1M per year for 2 years). Over \$800K has been committed with another \$425K identified and expected by the end of 2019, thus, the campaign is on track..

WSB is also holding their annual Vision Award luncheon, which is a fund raiser (\$100K goal) where a local person who has been extra supportive of WSB is honored. This event is scheduled for October 30th and information is available on the WSB website (tickets \$200 each, 250 total).

Pres and CEO Sharon Giovinazzo and Jim Coleman, Chairman of the Board of WSB, would much appreciate any donations that Lions or Lions clubs can provide to the Capital Campaign or the Vision Awards.

In 2018-19, MD2 contributed over \$28K, down from \$37K in 17-18. I hope that we can increase the sensitivity to the mission of WSB in MD2 and District 2E2 and thus the donations we provide.

I plan to organize another tour of 2E2 by our WSB CEO during the 2019-20 Lioms year, although I have not heard of any interest from any Lions clubs. Let me know if your club would like to have a presentation by our CEO.

September 11, October 7 and October 9: I observed Lions Quest Classrooms in Eagle Mountain-Saginaw ISD and Lake Worth ISD.

September 15: In Eagle Mountain-Saginaw I attended the Mental Health training which has been mandated by the Texas State Legislative House and Senate Bills of 2019. The counselors, assistant principals, and other members of their schools' faculties were present. Penny Willis from Lions Clubs International and myself represented Lions Quest. The required 8-hour Mental Health Training was excellent. The next day I completed an online evaluation and received my Youth Mental Health First Aid USA Certification.

Beginning on September 16th I started gathering Lions Quest statistics and validations as to how Lions Quest helps in the early identification of students who are faced with normal and/or mental challenges. I am "building" a packet which will be mailed, delivered and or e-mailed to superintendents and/or principals. The goal of this packet is to provide the education administrators "the how" Lions Quest contributes and meets the documentation demands of our State Legislation. This packet will also serve as a Lions Quest promotion packet for additional school districts who are looking to adopt Lions Quest.

Report- Diabetes Awareness Essay Contest

Update

After a short delay, I was able to create the application, instructions/rules, a summary for the Clubs, and a power point presentation about the Contest. The first three items are available on the District 2-E2 website and on the new website for the L.O.E.B. of District 2-E2.

I have reached out to local schools and organizations to promote this Essay contest and hope we have solid participation in this contest this year.

Concern

There was some concern expressed by the L.O.E.B. directors (including me), regarding the Rules which I created based on the Rules established by the MD-2 Council of Governors for the Diabetes Awareness Essay Contest.

The concern relates to the rule regarding eligibility based on marital status, because it seems outdated and unrelated to the ability of the prospective Essay Contest Applicant to succeed in school. Specifically, the Rules approved by the Council of Governors includes the following eligibility restriction:

6. Rules of Eligibility for Contestants...

g. Contestants shall not have been married, had a marriage annulled, cohabited with a person of the opposite sex who is unrelated to the Contestant or who has participated in the conception of a child before participation in the MD-2 contest.

My research indicates that the by-laws for District 2-E2 include Standing Rules for District Youth Contests. (see p. 59, Constitution, By-Laws, And Standing Rules of Lions Clubs International District 2-E2). Standing Rule 5, related to District Youth Contests, states that "The rules for the conduct of district youth contests shall abide by those established and published for the MD2 contests." (See *id.* at p. 60, Rule 5.1).

According to the MD-2 Policy Manual, the MD-2 Council of Governors are responsible for creating and approving any changes to the rules of the MD-2 Opportunity for Youth Contests (See pp. 39-40 Lions Club International MD-2- Texas, Policy Manual, Revisions Approved August 4, 2017).

Thus, we are unable to unilaterally change this rule at the District Level. We hope that we can generate discussion regarding this eligibility restriction and that we can advocate for a change in the Rules for essay contests going forward.
